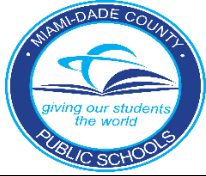

Students will be able to ... <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Assess their level of cooperation and determine how they can contribute when working with others.
	Lesson 2 The Power of Cooperation!	Students explore the topic of cooperation by looking at positive aspects and challenges they experience when working as a group.	How do we show cooperation?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Develop an understanding of the benefits of working as a team.
	Lesson 3 Cooperating with peers to resolve conflict	Students learn how they can effectively resolve conflicts by working cooperatively with others. Students assess how they have dealt with conflict in their own experiences.	How can we work together to make sure everyone wins?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Reflect on their own experiences when involved in conflict and develop strategies to resolve conflicts.

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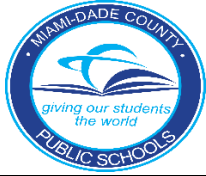

Students will be able to ... <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Identify examples of teens evaluating one another's photos online. Compare and contrast attitudes toward boys and girls regarding editing, posting, and commenting on personal photos that are posted on social network sites. Analyze broader gender norms and media messages that may frame the way people use and interpret photos on social network sites.

Students explore similarities and differences as well as assess their own levels of respect towards others. Students share how they can demonstrate respect to others. 	Lesson 3 Everyone is Unique	Students identify their similarities and differences and assess the importance of respecting the uniqueness of others. 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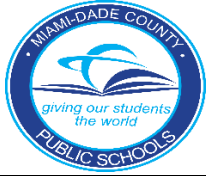

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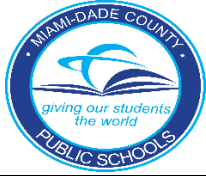

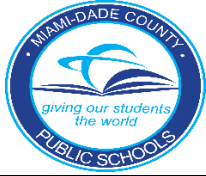
